Virginia's Story

- 464 foster-care youth aged out of care in Virginia in 2016 (51 in the Richmond metro area)
- Has the greatest need as fewer children exit foster care to permanency (78% compared to 88% nationally as reported by the Child Trends survey)
- Offers many of the supports recommended by experts, but coverage is inconsistent and largely unsupported by research
- Beginning in 2016, Virginia's "Fostering Futures" program extends care to age 21 using federal Title IV-E funding

- Ensuring this population has access to Medicaid coverage and public support
- Collaborating with peers across the nation to learn from and replicate best practices
- · Creating an atmosphere in which other states can replicate The Possibilities Project
